

## Matthew 5:1-12

When Jesus saw his ministry drawing huge crowds, he climbed a hillside. Those who were apprenticed to him, the committed, climbed with him. Arriving at a quiet place, he sat down and taught his climbing companions. This is what he said:

“You’re blessed when you’re at the end of your rope. With less of you there is more of God and his rule.

“You’re blessed when you feel you’ve lost what is most dear to you. Only then can you be embraced by the One most dear to you.

**“You’re blessed when you’re content with just who you are — no more, no less. That’s the moment you find yourselves proud owners of everything that can’t be bought.**

“You’re blessed when you’ve worked up a good appetite for God. He’s food and drink in the best meal you’ll ever eat.

“You’re blessed when you care. At the moment of being ‘care-full,’ you find yourselves cared for.

“You’re blessed when you get your inside world — your mind and heart — put right. Then you can see God in the outside world.

“You’re blessed when you can show people how to cooperate instead of compete or fight. That’s when you discover who you really are, and your place in God’s family.

“You’re blessed when your commitment to God provokes persecution. The persecution drives you even deeper into God’s kingdom.

“Not only that — count yourselves blessed every time people put you down or throw you out or speak lies about you to discredit me. What it means is that the truth is too close for comfort and they are uncomfortable. You can be glad when that happens — give a cheer, even! — for though they don’t like it, *I* do! And all heaven applauds. And know that you are in good company. My prophets and witnesses have always gotten into this kind of trouble.

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**Welcome!** We are glad you joined us this Sunday and look forward to meeting and getting to know you. Please join us after the 10 a.m. service for refreshments and friendship upstairs in Pilgrim Hall. **Sunday Worship** During our programming year (September through May), we offer our contemporary Change of Pace worship service in Pilgrim Hall at 9:00 a.m. There is a brief 15-minute communion service in our Douglas Memorial Chapel at 9:30 a.m. Our more traditional worship service is in the sanctuary at 10 a.m., and is normally followed by refreshments and friendship in Pilgrim Hall.

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**20/40** Our 20-, 30-, and 40- somethings meet on Wednesday evenings. Our first study this year is from the UCC "A Listen Up Bible Study" where we will explore Ecclesiastes, a four part series that will conclude on October 11. Our next gathering will be September 27 at Wolverine Tap for Pub Trivia. Child care is not provided.

**Disaster Relief** The Mission and Outreach Committee initiated a campaign for hurricane relief after Hurricane Harvey devastated Texas. When we began that campaign, we designated September 22nd as our cutoff for donations. Throughout this campaign, parts of the Caribbean and southern United States have been devastated by two more hurricanes, each as catastrophic as Harvey. Sadly, we now add to these disasters with the devastating earthquake in Mexico. In light of the additional natural disasters, we have extended the deadline for donations until Sunday, October 1, a fitting day as it is World Communion Sunday. Additionally, the committee continues to discuss the most appropriate disaster relief agency to send funds through. We are exploring options that include donation matching and agencies that are on the ground in the areas hit hardest. We want to make sure every dollar you so generously give is stretched as far as possible making the largest impact we can. The Mission and Outreach Committee has set aside another \$1,000 for this effort, bringing our total so far to \$4,992.

Hopefully, many of you will feel inspired to consider making a donation of any amount to our FCC fund. Write a check to FCC, put Disaster Relief on the memo line and mail to the church or put it in the offering plate this or next Sunday.

**Second Sunday** A presentation on **Interfaith Peacemaking in a World of Fear and Hostility** will be the first Contemporary Issues Second Sunday presentation for 2017-2018. George Lambrides is the presenter.

While conflict has always been part of the human condition, today's political and social climate seem to illustrate just how prone we are to "not get along", In this context, do people of faith and faith traditions have a significant role in peacemaking? Rev. Lambrides will draw from his leadership in the Interfaith Round Table and from his knowledge of peacemaking efforts around the world to discuss these issues both at a personal and national level.

The presentation will be at 11:10am-12:00pm on Sunday October 8th in the Mayflower room.

Rev. George Lambrides has been the Executive Director (now co-director) of the Interfaith Table of Washtenaw County since 1998. The IRT is a local organization of 30 religious congregations representing fifteen faith traditions whose mission is to help create a culture of understanding and inclusion. His career has also included work as an American Baptist minister since 1967 and a Protestant Chaplain for the University of Michigan Health System from 1997-2008 with an emphasis on palliative care. He is a graduate of Houghton College, N.Y., and has masters degrees from the Denver Seminary and the University of Oregon.
