THOUGHTS FROM DARCY CRAIN SENIOR MINISTER

Dear Friends:

I'm writing this from the pews of our sanctuary. I love coming in here during the weekday to pray or think or write. Especially on dreary cloudy days like this one. It's dark. Not pitch dark like Maundy Thursday, but still, dark. The blue colors from the stained glass windows are




as brilliant as ever in this diminished light. I have a favorite pew for these kinds of days. Choir side, about ¾ of the way back, I nestle in against one of the dividers. Sometimes sitting in the pews as a worshiper helps check my perspective. None of us started in pulpits, we started in pews.

From the pews, I first learned to fold my hands in prayer. I learned it was not ok to eat the cheerios I snuck in my pockets during the Lord's Prayer and that most families sat in the same pews week in and week out. I learned that God was in music and in Bible Study and in Sunday School and even at church camp where the pews were crude wooden benches in a semi-circle around a cross. From the pews, we come with our questions and our awe. We come seeking community and solitude at the same time, and church is one of the few places that fulfills such a contradictory order. We come to be held by God, a sensation heightened by my current nestling into this divider.

In the next month this sanctuary will feel more like a sweatbox in the summer months, but right now, it's perfect. Summer is a time when we take a break from our routine. Many use it as a time of renewal or rest. May you find your own spiritual safe place to nestle into and make the time to pray and reflect.

The work of faith requires awareness and consciousness. Life rewards us for going through the motions and checking off the boxes and keeping everything status quo. Our faith tells us that life is rarely that predictable and that God works through every hiccup, every misstep, every curveball that comes our way. In taking the time to root our feet in prayer, in reflection, in pausing to take stock of where we have come and where we are going.

Sunday Parking Still Free; Change to Parking in Structures Effective June 2, 2024



Please read the new information regarding Sunday parking from the State Street District below.

Lower structure and lot gate arms are available on Sundays. Parking will still be accessible and free on Sundays, but the gates will be down, and parking patrons must pull a ticket to enter the facility. When exiting, parking patrons will insert their parking ticket into the in-lane exit equipment, and the gate will go up.

Parkers who lose their ticket can use the same procedure as during the week: push the call button on the inlane equipment and speak with staff for assistance. Lost ticket charges will be waived for the first few months.

All in attendance said this was the best musical offering they'd ever heard before at FCC.


Intergenerational Mission Trip 2024



This is a combination of 3 families making on-line orders and the big Congregation order on November 7. You can help us raise more money for Sr. High and Intergenerational work-trips by using Scrip. Scrip gives the church a percentage of the amount you purchase with Scrip. I would recommend starting with e-gift certificates for one or two places that you shop regularly. You can look at the listing at RaiseRight.com. To get Scrip you will need to create an account.

HISTORIAN CORNER BETTY BISHOP

I am continuing with the article David Beck translated from a German newspaper published in Ann Arbor in 1894, which discussed the early history of The First Congregational Church of Ann Arbor. In the winter of 1860-61, the right to free speech came into question when Parker Pillsbury, a well-known proponent of slave emancipation, was supposed to speak in Ann Arbor. A mob gathered and threw stones at the speaker and congregation so the talk could not be given.



A month later the famous orator and abolitionist, Wendell Phillips came to Ann Arbor and needed a hall in which to speak. The Board of Directors of

FCC was approached about his using their original First Church. After a long debate, a church elder stood and said "Brothers, this building was dedicated to Almighty God, and if it must be razed to the ground, let it be done if it will help free speech and the noble cause of free humanity. I request that the church be given for use to Wendell Phillips". The motion was approved unanimously. University students became aware that the speaker might be attacked by a mob. The feeling of war had gripped everyone. The students formed a group and decided to attend en-masse and nip any rebellion in the bud. They were prepared for a fight but that did not happen. The church was filled to capacity and outside was the enraged mob. The success of the great speaker's inspiring words was shown by the significant enlistment into the Union Army.

The rest of the newspaper article dealt with the founding of Zion Lutheran Church and their early years in the old First Church which FCC had sold to the Zion Lutheran Society when they moved in 1876 to the Stone Church where FCC remains in 2024. Of course, the building has been significantly remodeled since 1876. Zion Lutheran remained in the First Church building until they built a new church in 1894.

MISSIONS AND OUTREACH COMMITTEE SUZANNE PRICE, CHAIR

Caring for our neighbors in Washtenaw County, Detroit, the nation, and internationally is our committee's charge. This year, thanks to the generosity of our congregation, our committee awarded grants to 14 local non-profit organizations with awards ranging from \$500 to \$6,000. Our Life Happens Grants provided donations in amounts from \$1,000 to \$2,000 to the following organizations: the American Red Cross for relief due to national weather disasters; to the Palestine Children's Relief Fund; to Doctors without Borders in Israel and Gaza; to Against Malaria for international health aid, and \$256 in bus tokens for several local non-profits. With the church budget of \$34,000 and an additional \$2,150 in gifts to Missions and Outreach from individual church members, FCC has provided funds to support a variety of critical needs.

In March, the proceeds to FCC from the Measure-to-Measure Choir Concert, done in collaboration with First United Methodist Church, allowed for a \$1,600 donation to the International Rescue Fund in Ukraine. We thank the choirs, musicians, and the choir directors for this substantial gift used for world humanitarian aid.

In March our church members and friends stepped up to support the Easter Giving Tree with donations of household goods worth an estimated \$2,500 and monetary donations of \$1928, used to outfit apartments for refugees being resettled this spring and summer by Jewish Family Services. This was a record amount for the Easter drive and JFS expressed their delight and gratitude for the quality and quantity of goods they received from us. Mission and Outreach thanks church member Jane Thomson for her significant work in designing the item tags and organizing the bulletin board display.

We thank Gayle Haynes for delivering weekly to the Hope Clinic Pantry the donated food brought to FCC. By March 2024, Gail estimated that FCC members and friends donated food and personal or household supplies worth \$2,500.

We thank Helen Zylman and David Seaman, as well as Sheryl Kurze for regularly taking clothing brought to church for donation to House by the Side of the Road in Ann Arbor. Clothes are given away free at HBSR. Many local non-profits take clients there and it provides much needed clothing to those seeking wardrobe items.


In May, FCC had its first Clothing Closet drive to collect used business clothing for college students and others. The clothes went to student clothing closets that exist at University of Michigan, Eastern Michigan University and at Michigan State University. We thank church member Laura Lamps for proposing and initiating this project. Thanks to our congregation, the drive was a phenomenal success with hundreds of items donated for men and women. In addition, we thank Colleen Creal and her recently graduated son and daughter for dramatizing roles in a video to promote this project. Thank you to Jared Peterson, the FCC office manager and tech production staff member, for producing the video. A special thanks to Jane Pettit and Eric Overdier, in addition to M&O Committee members for their participation in collecting the clothes. Thanks for your clothing contributions, church!

BUILDING AND GROUNDS SUBCOMMITTEE JANET ALLEN, MEMBER

The Building and Grounds Committee continues to provide regular maintenance to the church inside and out. In addition to unexpected repairs and yearly maintenance, several larger projects are scheduled for this coming fiscal year.

Sanctuary Wheelchair Seating

Four ADA compliant spaces were recently completed in the front of the sanctuary. Prior to this work, there were two noncompliant spaces. We were pleased that the expense was mostly labor as we had access to using shorter pews in the balcony and are using choir chairs for the companion seating (being recovered by pew cushion fabric to match). Two more spaces will be created near the back just forward of the sound booth on the center aisle providing our wheel chair using members and guests a choice of seating.



Pilgrim Hall Windows Refurbishing

We are hiring Thompson Glass to refurbish our beautiful stain glass windows in Pilgrim Hall. The work will start this summer on the north side of the building (Memorial Garden side) and will continue next year with the south side to spread out the expense. This work includes cleaning, new caulk and paint on the outside and well as cleaning, replacement of some broken glass and regrouting some of the lead on the inside.

Rebuilding the North Entrance Stairway

The outside leaning stairway to the Narthex on Thompson Street will be rebuilt by our stone and masonry specialists, Cashero Raycraft. The work will begin July 22.

Sanctuary Wall Water Leak

Water Intrusion Issues are always very difficult and this has been no exception. We continue to investigate and consult with several experts to solve this frustrating issue so repairs can be made to the plaster as soon as we are confident the issue has been solved.
