THOUGHTS FROM DARCY CRAIN SENIOR MINISTER

Dear Friends:

There are 4 August birthdays in my family; my twins, my brother, and myself. We all get together for dinner somewhere to celebrate the four birthdays and this year it was a restaurant called K-Pot in Novi. Maybe you've been. If you haven't, it's like Mongolian BBQ meets self-



grill hibachi. In other words, you go to a restaurant and pay to basically cook your own food. You pick your own sauces (mine are always a disaster) and then order copious amounts of various meat that is brought to the table raw. You then use the little grills embedded in your table to cook them yourself to your liking. Did I mention already that you pay to cook your own food at this restaurant? In any case, it is a fun family dinner, and no one ever leaves hungry.

My sons tried pork belly for the first time and we cooked our steak rare, because my family prefers our meat still mooing. We would be cut off from the people according to Leviticus standards where it clearly state: "Anyone who eats the fat of an animal from which an offering by fire may be made to the Lord must be cut off from his people. If anyone eats blood of an animal that person must be cut off from his people." (Leviticus 7.22-27 ish).

To our defense, we weren't planning on burning the fat we ate as a burnt offering to the Lord, so I guess we get off on a loophole for that transgression.

Leviticus. The book of priestly law code that is full of helpful gems like: how to remove kidneys from a young bull to offer as a sacrifice, and how to never touch the skin of a dead pig, and what to do if you accidentally sin but don't realize you had. We don't usually preach from it. People usually find it too gory or archaic. I find it fascinating and overlooked. Given my proclivity for obscure Hebrew Scriptures, I think you know where this is going....

This year we kick off the season with a series on Leviticus called: "Leviticus Unlocked: Ancient Laws for Today's Faith." The laws of Leviticus can seem barbaric and outdated. Blood, guts, fire, and so many repetitive rules. Why?



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What might the priestly manual from the Hebrew Bible tell us about the order of life that God intended for humanity? Through this series, we will unlock the ancient laws of Leviticus, so that they may inform our faith and how we live our lives today. I promise you it won't be boring! Also, you can thank Lily and Eric, because I originally thought this would better fit into 8-10 weeks, but they talked me down to four. It's good to be a part of a team of pastors!

BIBLE 101 FCC ADULT EDUCATION




New Adult Education Offering this Fall: Bible 101





These services include a pantry of choice where shoppers pick the food they want including dairy, meat and fresh produce, a delivery service for those who do not have transportation, a farm stand that provides fresh produce, a hot meal program 6 days a week, emergency food bags, and baby care items.

PERENNIAL WATERS PROJECT ST. PHILIP LUTHEREN CHURCH, TRENTON, MI

Our FCC Bookkeeper, Crystal McBride spoke with Darcy about an environmentally conscious advocacy group, called Perennial Waters, which she learned about at her daughter's open house. They did a water runoff from a massive roof at a church into a rain garden, which helps with water bills while also growing pollinator plants etc. Darcy thought it a great idea to mention them in the Courier as a way to educate/ interest others in the Perennial Waters Projects.



ABOUT THE PERENNIAL WATERS PROJECT

During the spring of '19, a project centered on the grounds of the church and preschool was proposed. The project would organize and activate grassroots community social/ecological commitments in "Downriver" neighborhoods south of Detroit, Michigan. Here began **The Perennial Waters Project** (PWP). We developed *rain gardens* and *pollinator gardens* for the preschool on the campus of St. Philip Church, with the hope that they may serve as models for the development of other regional common-space gardens. When you are outside, you may not notice hummingbirds, bats, bees, beetles, butterflies, and flies carrying pollen from one plant to another as they collect nectar. However, these hard-working animals help pollinate over 75 percent of the world's flowering plants, and nearly 75 percent of our crops. Without pollinators, wildlife would have fewer nutritious berries and seeds to eat, and we would miss many fruits, vegetables, and nuts, like blueberries, squash, and almonds — not to mention chocolate, and coffee, all of which depend on pollinators.

PWP is a *community outreach project*, a ministry of St. Philip ELCA church in Trenton, MI. Those members to whom we reach out may most often be the landscape itself and the critters who share this beautiful South East Michigan region with us. It is a diverse membership within our regional ecosystem and our boundaries are porous.

September 11 - PATRIOT DAY and NATIONAL DAY OF SERVICE AND REMEMBRANCE

tional Work Trips and the Youth Summer Work Trips. We even had a couple of Florida birds helping out.




We are planning to do this



It is a new fiscal year, so happy new year! As of July 1, 2024, two families have raised \$50.00 already. How can you help?


- Think of a place you frequent regularly, like Meijer, or Walmart, or Gordon Foods. You can check what is available at Raise Right without having an account.

HISTORIAN CORNER BETTY BISHOP



From time to time I am asked about the stained glass windows at the church. The lovely and colorful windows in the sanctuary were added under Rev. Dr. Parr during the renovations in the early 1940s. The individual windows were given by various donors, often in memory of family members. For example, The Great East Window was given, by James Rowland Angell, President Emeritus of Yale University, in memory of his parents, Dr. James Burrill Angell and Sarah Caswell Angell. James Burrill Angell was President of the University of Michigan from 1871 until 1909. He and

his wife were active members of FCC during their years in Ann Arbor. Other windows were given as memorials to pastors and church members.

The windows in Pilgrim Hall were included when Pilgrim Hall was added to the church between 1951 and 1954. The seven large stained glass windows there tell stories of American history from the Mayflower to the Liberty Bell and Paul Revere, and pioneers moving West. There is also one window for the Scrooby Church in England where Congregationalism started in the 16th century. These windows were designed and made by Wipple and Company of Exeter and London, England, a firm which worked on the restoration of Exeter Cathedral. The story of the stained glass windows at FCC, especially the windows in Douglas Chapel, will continue in another issue of the Courier.

Avalon Housing's Hickory Way Pantry Volunteers

This summer our church began a group volunteer opportunity with the food pantry of Avalon Housing's Hickory Way Apartments located on S. Maple Rd in Ann Arbor. Starting in June, FCC provided two - three volunteers to assist Avalon staff members in setting up the pantry with food and household supplies received from Food Gatherers in the morning. Our church is volunteering on the 4th Wednesday of the month from 9:00 a.m.to 1:00p.m. Our job is to set the food out before the pantry opens and to assist the residents in selecting the products they want from the produce, dairy, meat and fish, boxed and canned foods, and household supplies. When the pantry closes, we help to put perishable foods in the refrigerator and store shelf-stable things in their kitchen. The pantry is open on Monday and Wednesday, alternating weeks. Avalon Housing provides housing and support services to members of the community who have experienced housing insecurity. Their mission: Housing First.

Pilgrim Hall Stain Glass Windows

Refurbishing our beautiful stain glass windows in Pilgrim Hall has begun. This year we contracted to do the north side (Memorial Garden) of the room and next summer we will bring Thompson Glass back to do the south side (parking lot) of the room. Windows in the Pilgrim Hall lobby will be done in 2026. Their work included new face putty and

painting on the outside, cleaning of win-

dows and frames, new caulk and paint. Several panels were removed to be more extensively repaired in their shop. We anticipate the north side will be completed by kick off Sunday.

Rebuilding North Stairs (outside the Narthex to William Street)



Cashero Raycraft returned to rebuild the leaning/deteriorating Street. Work scope included rebuilding to plumb the stone cheek

stairs from the Narthex to William

walls on each side of the steps and leveling the landing paver and treads on each step. Since it was determined two treads were broken and the rest were saturated with moisture contaminants from over the years, new limestone will be used to ensure this stairway is solid for decades to come.





Irrigation System

Several repairs were made to the irrigation system. In addition a survey was done regarding all the zones and run times with adjustments made to cut down watering time and save on our water bill.

from someone (or a bot) pretending to be FCC staff/clergy. As a reminder, FCC staff and ministers will not ask you for personal information or gift cards, nor will they tell you they cannot speak because they are busy in prayer meetings (that's a popular one). Furthermore,

if someone offers a baby grand piano of their deceased husband this is also a scam. When in doubt, call the church office, but don't respond to the suspicious email or text. If it doesn't "sound" like one of us, it's probably not. If you receive an email that seems suspicious, do not respond immediately, and never open attachments. If you confirm it is spam/phishing, report it as such and block the sender.
