THOUGHTS FROM DARCY CRAIN SENIOR MINISTER

Dear Friends:

I was reading one of my daily devotionals from a pastor hero of mine and she shared a Chinese parable that I think is perfect for heading into the holiday season and new year. It's about a water carrier that carried two large jars of water across a shoulder yoke on the long path to



his master's house. One day the cracked jar spoke to the water carrier. (Yes, you read that right, the cracked jar is speaking. Hey, we have a Bible story where the donkey speaks, angels speak, and so does a burning bush so a talking cracked jar shouldn't be completely out of the realm of possibility for us). In any case, the cracked jar said:


"I feel so guilty I leak water every day, and I fail to do my job properly. Why don't you replace me with a better jar?"

The water carrier smiled kindly and said, "Tomorrow, as we walk back from the stream, look at the ground along your side of the path."

The next day, the cracked jar noticed something remarkable. Along its side of the path, flowers were blooming—bright, beautiful flowers that were absent on the other side. The water carrier said, "I have always known about your crack. I planted seeds along your side of the path, and each day, as you leaked water, you helped these flowers grow. Without you, this beauty would not exist."

This is one wise water carrier and one guilt ridden cracked jar. In this parable I see echoes of the psalmist in Psalm 138.8 "The Lord will fulfill his purpose for me; your steadfast love, O Lord, endures forever. Do not forsake the work of your hands."

We are quick to forsake our work, our dreams, and ourselves because in some way we are all like that cracked jar. Imperfect. We all hope to accomplish more than we can. We often compare ourselves to others and walk away feeling we aren't enough. As we head into the Christmas season when sometimes it seems like everyone else's jar is sealed and on point and ours is a duct taped wreck,

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remember this parable. Remember the Psalm. God will fulfill purposes beyond our recognition, and do beautiful things with the cracked vessels we are. We are to trust that God does not demand perfection. In fact, it is through our cracks that beauty beyond our planning takes root. May the beauty you plant this Christmas and New Year remind you to not forsake yourself or your efforts, for the enduring love of God will be born among us once again.

As we march into the holidays and then into the New Year, we have the opportunity for much celebration. However, if your life is anything like mine, there will also be the opportunity for stress and anxiety along the way. Whether at a Christmas party or planning goals for the upcoming year, anxiety often feels like an unwelcome guest in our lives. It can barge right into the party and threaten to unravel our sense of peace and enjoyment in life. As people of faith seeking to live with intention and care, it can be helpful to reflect on the roots of our anxiety and how we might transform it into something life giving.



In Matthew 6:25, Jesus speaks about anxiety with gentle yet profound clarity. He tells his followers, "Do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear." The Greek word used here for worry is merimna, which can be translated as "care" or "concern." It is also the Greek word for "worry" and "anxiety." The literal etymology of the word is "mind divided" and can convey a sense of being pulled in different directions or divided within oneself.

When merimna takes root in us, it can feel as though we are stretched thin, consumed by competing fears about the future or pressures from the present. This fragmented state can leave us feeling disconnected—from our inner peace, from others, and from the Divine. Yet, Jesus does not reject the idea of caring altogether. After all, care is at the heart of love. The issue lies not in our desire to be concerned, but in letting that care overwhelm or divide us.

So how might we reconcile the tension between our anxieties and our capacity to care? One way is to center our merimnan love. The kind of care that reflects God's wisdom is not one of frantic worry but of rooted attention. It is the kind of care that notices the lilies of the field, and the birds of the air, recognizing their beauty, and trusting in the abundant provision of creation.

As a community, we are called to hold each other in this kind of care. We acknowledge that anxiety is a natural part of life, yet we gently remind one another not to let it steer the ship. Instead, we guide our concerns into meaningful action, knowing we cannot control all outcomes but can choose how to live faithfully in the present.

In our world today, there is so much to be anxious about. But, at the same time, there is so much to care about. May we live out our lives of faith, finding the balance to care about people and the world that can make a real impact in the lives of others. May we show this love and care in our words, as well as in our actions. May we learn together to do this without giving into the temptation to feel overwhelmed in anxiety. As we reflect on where merimna shows up in our lives, may we be reminded of what we truly care about. Are there ways in which our concerns divide or cause us to lose sight of love? What would it look like to transform those concerns into a deeper, steadier care—for yourself, for others, and for the world?



Let us walk together, seeking peace that sustains, and care that connects.

A food bank volunteer put together a thoughtful list of items needed, some suggestions, and some things they learned from those in need:



- Everyone donates Kraft Mac and Cheese in the box. They can rarely use it because it needs milk and butter which is hard to get from regular food banks.
- Boxed milk is a treasure, as kids need it for cereal, which is a frequently donated item.
- Everyone donates pasta sauce and spaghetti noodles.
- They cannot eat all the canned veggies and soup unless you put a can opener in too, or buy pop tops.
- Oil is a luxury but needed for Rice a-Roni, which is also a frequently donated item.
- Spices or salt and pepper would be a real Christmas gift.
- Tea bags and coffee make them feel like you care.
- Sugar and flour are treats.
- They fawn over fresh produce donated by farmers and grocery stores.
- Seeds are cool in Spring and Summer because growing can be easy for some.
- They rarely get fresh meat.
- Tuna and crackers make a good lunch.
- Hamburger Helper goes nowhere without ground beef.
- They get lots of peanut butter and jelly but usually not sandwich bread.
- Butter or margarine is nice, too.
- Eggs are a real commodity.
- Cake mix and frosting makes it possible to make a child's birthday cake.
- Dishwashing detergent is very expensive, and not frequently donated.
- Feminine hygiene products are a luxury, and women will cry over that.
- Everyone loves Stove Top Stuffing.




locations around Ann Arbor such as the Summer Art Fair and at the Ann Arbor Farmers

Jacqueline Imani lived in a village in the Democratic Republic of Congo with her family and young children when fighting broke out there in

2008. Her parents and siblings were all killed and she fled with her very small children. She ended up in a refugee camp in Uganda where she remained for 15 years; surviving off her gifts of sewing, creating clothing and goods for sale. After all that time, the call finally came for her to get to leave the camp and go the US, but she had only 4 days to prepare. She came here with 4 children as a single mom. She works many hours in environmental services at Glacier Hills and still finds time to keep up her beautiful clothing business.

Maksym and Jacqueline have blessed us not only with their crafts but their incredible resilience and strength in the journeys that brought them here. Thank you both!




still delays in the mail system so mail your check early if that is how you contribute.



HISTORIAN CORNER BETTY BISHOP

Going back almost 100 years, the period of Rev. Allison Heaps' ministry at FCC, between July 1928 and the spring of 1937 was a challenging time for FCC. The Rev. Jump had left in 1927 following conflicts with some of the congregation. While the search went on for a new Senior Minister, a former FCC minister, Rev. Carl Patton, came over each weekend by train from the Chicago Theological Seminary where he was teaching, and he served as supply minister for a year. When Rev. Heaps started at FCC, financial conditions were deteriorating, men were out of work, and the general attitude was one of pessimism. Church collections diminished, attendance at Sunday services declined,



and there were some physical problems with the church building. Many did like his sermons and he sought valiantly to hold the Church together during all of the stresses of the Great Depression.

At one point, there was discussion of a merger between the Presbyterian and Congregational churches with the understanding that both ministers would resign and the new enlarged church would call a new minister. They abandoned this proposal after considerable discussion by both churches. Rev. Heaps submitted his resignation in 1934, but it was not accepted, and he remained another three years. During that time, the church studied what should be its objectives and what program of activities would be most effective in



meeting these objectives. They concluded that members knew too little about the finances and administration of the church, that Sunday services were essential and more members should be encouraged to attend, and that religious education should be provided for all ages. They also recognized that new agencies had taken over many of the welfare and social services formerly sponsored by the church. In October 1937, FCC called Rev. Leonard Parr to ministry, beginning an era of many changes.

BUILDING AND GROUNDS SUBCOMMITTEE JANET ALLEN, MEMBER

The Building and Grounds Subcommittee welcomed a new member, Bob Osterheldt. Bob comes to us with experience managing properties and quickly plunged in to help to install the rainbow doors outside the front entrance of the church last month. We are grateful to Bob for his interest in serving on the Building and Grounds Committee! Our latest accomplishments are:

- New door hardware entering Pilgrim Hall Kitchen from the lobby. The door had become nearly possible to unlock and enter the kitchen so a new lock and door assembly with easy to open door handle was installed.
- Choir TV Monitor mounted under the North Balcony. The addition of this monitor allows the choir to view videos and slides broadcast during the church service on the screens behind their seats. (See page 8)
- Wheelchair seating additions: Earlier this year, we modified the two areas in the front row of the sanctuary to provide space for two wheelchairs and two companion chairs on each side. We now offer a choice for sitting near the back by providing space for two wheelchairs and two companion chairs in front of the sound booth. This brings the church up to ADA compliance by providing six spaces for our guests using wheelchairs and their companions. (See page 7)
- **Sidewalk replacement** along William Street. Several slabs of concrete sidewalk were broken during our latest tuck-pointing work. As part of the original contract with Cashero Raycraft, these slabs were slated for repair. In the meantime, the city of Ann Arbor marked three additional slabs as mandated for fixing. We are pleased to report Cashero Raycraft replaced the additional three slabs at no additional cost while they were doing the contracted work. This was a savings of \$1500 for FCC, and we continue to appreciate the generosity of Cashero Raycraft in the work they do for us.
- Fall Yard Clean-up: The grounds look amazing after the annual Fall Yard Clean-up. The Building and Grounds Committee appreciates everyone who worked at this event as well as the ongoing work of many members in various outside areas around the church throughout the year.
- Water Intrusion Update: A number of modifications have been made to the chimney outside the Sanctuary wall showing water damage. Moisture readings, taken at monthly intervals, show a continual reduction in the moisture content of the stone walls in that area since the modifications were completed. While it can take up to a year for the wall to dry out enough to do the inside repair, we are hopeful we are finally on the right track to solving this persistent issue.


